

## Humanitarian funding analysis: Conflict and displacement in Yemen



### 1. Key points

- As of 1 April 2015, US\$97 million in humanitarian assistance has been reported to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA)'s Financial Tracking Service (FTS) for Yemen in 2015
- The largest donor has been the European Commission's Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection Department (ECHO) reporting US\$31 million so far in 2015, nearly a third of the total
- The 2015 strategic response plan (SRP) is the largest ever UN-coordinated appeal for Yemen at US\$748 million: so far it is 9% funded
- 50% of requirements for the 2015 SRP are for projects relating to food security
- There are challenges in the data in identifying funding specifically for internally displaced persons (IDPs) or by geographic region.
- Yemen is classed as a forgotten emergency by ECHO: it has appeared in its forgotten crisis assessment (FCA) index every year for the past six years.

### 2. Recent humanitarian funding to Yemen


**Donors have contributed/committed US\$97 million of humanitarian funding to Yemen so far in 2015**, both within and outside the Yemen Strategic Response Plan (SRP) 2015. **The largest donor is ECHO (US\$31 million) followed by Japan (US\$19 million) and the United States (US\$12 million).** These three donors have **accounted for 64%** of humanitarian funding reported to Yemen in the first three months of 2015.

There are additional outstanding pledges totalling (US\$1.7 million) from three donors, the United States (US\$750,000), Ireland (US\$561,167) and Switzerland (US\$434,783).

No Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) allocation has been reported to Yemen in 2015.

From the data reported to the FTS, it is not possible to disaggregate how much of the total is specifically for IDPs or for specific regions within Yemen.



### 3. Funding to the Yemen Emergency Response Fund (ERF)

In 2015, so far **US\$18.2 million** is available from the Yemen Emergency Response Fund (ERF), of which **US\$2.2 million** has been allocated. The majority of ERF funding has so far been allocated to the health sector via the World Health Organization (WHO, US\$895,738).

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Figure 2: ERF funding to Yemen by sector



## 4. Yemen Strategic Response Plan (SRP) 2015

The 2015 Yemen SRP is part of a multi-year appeal. The current requirements of the Yemen 2015 SRP are **US\$748 million**, the largest ever UN appeal in the country. 50% of the requested requirements are for projects related to [food security](#).


Figure 3: Top five clusters by requirement for the 2015 Yemen SRP


## 6. Pledges of aid in the media in response to current situation

Beyond what has been reported to FTS there are currently no reports in the media of new pledges to Yemen from major donors in response to the current escalation of the crisis.

## 7. Humanitarian funding trends to Yemen (historic)

The US was the largest humanitarian donor to Yemen over the five year period 2010-2014, followed by the European Commission (EC) and the UK. Together these three donors provided just over 50% of all humanitarian assistance to Yemen in that period.
